Hurlstone Agricultural High School celebrates Education Week 2019

The innovative teaching and learning happening at **Hurlstone Agricultural High School** will be on display **all week** as part of the school's Education Week 2019 celebrations.



As your school leader I have been selected as one of only two High School Principals in NSW in an Australian wide research initiative to support Principals as **STEAM** Leaders: Building the Evidence Base for Improved **STEAM** Learning is an initiative of, and funded by, the Australian Government Department of Education and Training.

















During the project, researchers from partner universities will monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of the Professional Learning (PL) and its impact in schools. School involvement in the research is therefore critical to the success of the project.

In addition to the benefits derived from the PL, participating in the research will support our students and our learning community to critically reflect on our school's **STEAM** journey and identify significant school-based factors that shape success — both now and in the future. While the research involves additional engagement through surveys, interviews, classroom observations, and focus groups of teachers and hopefully students, our research partners will be supporting our school journey.

Our school teachers in **STEAM** are currently completing online surveys. Vanessa Garrick and Paul Pittas as Head Teachers will be leading teams through literacy and future focussed opportunities for our students.

With half the academic year remaining, it is timely to make a few reminders so that second semester moves smoothly.

Please remember to write a note when you child is late so that their lateness will be verified and so you don't get a call from one of us asking to explain your child's lateness.

If your child needs to leave school early, they require a note signed by you which indicates the time they need to leave and clear details about how they need to travel – as well as their name and year. Students need to submit these to a deputy BEFORE school starts so that this can be recorded on the daily attendance roll.

A committee is working on a review of the current timetable structure to address issues for a range of subjects. To aid in the planning, you are asked to complete the following survey by Tuesday week 4 – August 13.

With HSC trials underway, we would like to remind you to ring the school if your child is unable to attend a scheduled examination. If they are sick, they MUST have a doctor complete the paperwork in the HAHS Assessment policy booklet found on the Sentral portal. In the case of illness, a doctor's certificate is not enough. If there is any other type of misadventure (not illness) please follow the procedures in the booklet or ring for support.

During the trial examinations, the library is available for study by Year 12 periods 1-3 only where supervision is offered. Students must sign in at the front office as we need to know who is on site in case of emergency, however unlikely. Students have been asked to go home immediately after any exam UNLESS they have 2 examinations in 1 day. Students should not attend school if they have no examinations. We ask you to help here by knowing what your child is doing.

As deputies, our role is not simply administrative as we all teach and engage with students in a range of areas. We are looking forward to celebrating your children's successes and look forward to more dialogue with parents too.



HAHS - Careers Corner with Ms Keegan

I would like to share something that I read recently that I believe has implications for all of us as we contemplate future study and career directions, especially for current students who are considering their options and making important decisions.



The following is written by Greg Satell who is an internationally renowned entrepreneur, executive and one of the foremost experts on innovation today. He is a popular speaker, adviser and author of the new book, <u>Cascades: How to Create a Movement that Drives Transformational Change</u>, and he frequently writes for <u>Harvard Business Review</u>, <u>Barron's</u>, <u>Forbes</u>, <u>Inc.</u> and <u>Fast Company</u>. His earlier book, <u>Mapping Innovation</u>, was selected as one of the best business titles of 2017.

"Traditionally, school work has been based on individual accomplishment. You were supposed to study at home, come in prepared and take your test without help. If you looked at your friend's paper, it was called cheating and you got in a lot of trouble for it. We were taught to be accountable for achievements on our own merits.

Yet consider how the nature of work has changed, even in highly technical fields. In 1920, most scientific papers were written by sole authors, but by 1950 that had changed and co-authorship became the norm. Today, the average paper has four times as many authors as it did then and the work being done is far more interdisciplinary and done at greater distances than in the past.

Make no mistake. The high value work we do today is being done in teams and that will only increase as more jobs become automated. The jobs of the future will not depend as much on knowing facts or crunching numbers, but will involve humans collaborating with other humans to design work for machines.

Collaboration will increasingly be a competitive advantage. That's why we need to pay attention not just to how our kids work and achieve academically, but how they play, resolve conflicts and make others feel

supported and empowered. The truth is that value has shifted from cognitive skills to social skills. As kids will increasingly be able to learn complex subjects through technology, the most important class may well be recess.

Perhaps most of all, we need to be honest with ourselves and make peace with the fact that our kids' educational experience will not – and should not – mirror our own. The world which they will need to face will be far more complex and more difficult to navigate than anything we could imagine back in the old days."

Employers want employees who are tech savvy, collaborate, have problem solving skills. That being the case, where do our students learn these attributes, how and who will teach them these life skills?

Heather Morris: Author Talk



At its essence, our world is a web comprising the threads of people's stories, all connected and interwoven with one another. In this way, we are inextricably tied to each others' successes and joys. One such story is that of Lale Sokolov's, which has been immortalised in Heather Morris' *The Tattooist of Auschwitz*, a novel released to universal acclaim.

On the 17th of June, Year 11 Extension English students were given the opportunity to visit Liverpool City Library and listen to the circumstances surrounding Heather's journey in writing the novel; from her initial encounter with Lale - who'd only wanted a memoir written about his life in Auschwitz, to her eventual travels around the globe to promote the novel, along with all the parts in between. There were the bids to publish it as a movie manuscript, during which Lale had staunchly decided on having Ryan Gosling play him; Lale's womanising ways; and the growth of her relationship with Lale, blossoming into a strong, fortuitous bond.

What may have been the most impactful to us, however, were her recounts on how Lale's story had affected an innumerable amount of others. Heather told of the emails she'd received, Jewish people she'd met, prisoners she'd visited, even people who'd known Lale during his time in Auschwitz, who'd all divulged to her their anguished accounts of their experiences after reading her novel. Yet, she was always insistent that her writing was merely a vehicle for Lale's story. She wasn't telling **the** story of WW2, she was telling **a** story of WW2.

With the conclusion of Heather's rousing spiel, we were given the opportunity to engage in short but meaningful conversations with her in a discussion about our newfound insights into what writing and storytelling could offer. Although the majority of us were not familiar with her novel, that did not matter; from her talk alone, it was clear to us that writing is not only a tool for education or financial gain, but a medium for thought-provoking stories and a representation of the way the threads of people's lives have been sewn together.

So, if we've left you curious about Lale's story, we deeply encourage you to borrow a copy of The Young Adult Edition of The Tattooist of Auschwitz at the school library!

Premier's Reading Challenge: PRC

It's positive to see that 90 students from Years 7-9 have already been validated for the 2019 Premier's Reading Challenge. The PRC closes this year at 11.59pm on Friday 30 August, which is week 6 of this term ... the reading countdown is on.

Research within Australia has identified a concerning decline in the amount of time students spend reading for pleasure over the transition period of finishing primary school and the start of high school. Various reasons have been identified for this decline including the expectations and demands of starting secondary school and the increase of homework. However, for a large majority of Year 7 Hurlstone students it has been encouraging to see the avid reading that has been demonstrated.

Year 7 reading information:

- Ciaran-Cian has already borrowed 84 books from the Hurlstone Library this year.
- 7M prefer to read books from the following genres: mystery, crime, fantasy, dystopian and science-fiction.
- The most read books by 7M for this year's PRC are Harry Potter and The Chamber of Secrets and Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban.
- 7E have used their persuasive language skills to convince Mr Malak (their Year 7 advisor and English Teacher) to read Harry Potter: he has started!
- Many of our students are also keen borrowers from their local libraries: Donald in 7R has borrowed a total of 508 books from his local library.
- Donald's favourite PRC book this year is The Happiest Refugee by Anh Do: "it tells a compelling story of a Vietnamese immigrant and his journey to success."
- Kienan in 7R recommends All Fall Down by Susan Geason because it's a "thrilling adventure."
- Rose also recommends All Fall Down, but by author Ally Carter.
- Gordon in 7U recommends Agents of the Glass by author Michael D. Beil "... kept me on my toes, making me read faster to get to the end."
- 7I love fantasy as a genre but they promised Ms Young to try some thrillers or historical fiction for PRC





Principals as STEM Leaders: Building the Evidence Base for Improved STEM Learning is an initiative of, and funded by, the Australian Government Department of Education and Training.

We would like to invite your child's participation in the research project: *Principals as STEM Leaders – Building the Evidence Base for Improved STEM Learning (PASL)* is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education and Training, under the *Inspiring all Australians in Digital Literacy – Embracing the Digital Age* measure of the National Innovation and Science Agenda (NISA).

What is the purpose of this study?

This project will deliver a set of three programs of professional learning (PL) for developing the capabilities of principals for leading school-wide ongoing enhancement of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) teaching and learning.

The PASL Project Objectives are:

- To determine best practice and expand evidence-based approaches that enhance students'
 STEM engagement and outcomes through the professional development of principals as
 STEM leaders.
- Develop high quality and accessible resources and a supporting mentoring model to be made available beyond the life of the project.
- Evaluate both the impact of the resources and the project processes and share lessons learned to inform future policy and practice.

Why has my child been invited to participate?

Your child is invited to participate in the project because your school's principal is participating in PL about STEM leadership as part of the project. In addition to their participation in a PL program, your school is participating in the research in the following ways:

Your principal and teachers of STEM subjects are asked to participate in surveys and interviews at the beginning of your Principal's participation in the PL, after the PL, and at approximate 6 monthly intervals thereafter until December 2020. Your principal will also participate in an interview with an external evaluator. We are interested in finding out about how this PL might influence STEM learning and teaching in your child's class and in the school more broadly

Please note that your child's participation is voluntary and that there are no consequences with the Australian Government Department of Education or the University of Tasmania if you decide not to participate.

What is involved?

Surveys

We are requesting your child's involvement in surveys as part of the research.



















Only students whose parents have consented to them undertaking the survey will be included. The surveys will be undertaken in the students' own familiar school environment using processes deemed suitable by the school. Teachers administering the survey will be given a short, plain language script to read to the students prior to them starting the survey. The online survey will start with a consent form to which students must agree before the survey questions are presented.

The survey will consist of several parts addressing factors recognised as having an impact on students' STEM learning outcomes. The survey sections will include basic information about the student (age etc.). Other sections will be items addressing students' beliefs about STEM and its learning (e.g., I think I am good at sciences; I enjoy learning maths), interest in STEM (e.g., I am interested in finding out about maths ideas), self-efficacy for STEM (e.g., I am confident that I could help a classmate with maths homework), and motivations (e.g., Doing well in STEM will help me get a job). Younger children will be asked to respond using 'smiley faces', and each question may be read to them by the person supervising.

All surveys will ask for the school name. This information will be deleted once the school has been assigned an ID number, and all analyses will be conducted with de-identified data. In order to protect privacy, we will ask all participants to construct a code e.g., the first two letters of your mother's maiden name, your 2-digit day of birth, and the last two letters of the town in which you were born. So, for example someone whose mother was Kim Beswick, birthday is October 6 and was born in Yackandandah would write BEO6AH. The names of the school and any individuals will be removed before any analysis is undertaken. No individual level data will be identifiable in the reports.

The surveys will be delivered online using a secure link or in hard copy for younger students where requested by the school. The whole survey will take approximately 30 minutes to fit with school timetables. All sections will be taken from existing instruments used in previous studies and in the public domain. Surveys will be administered at the beginning of your Principal's participation in the PL, after the PL, and at approximate 6 monthly intervals thereafter until December 2020.

Photographs and work samples

During the interviews with your school principal and teaching staff, they may want to share artefacts (e.g., planning documents, student work samples, school newsletter) that illustrate the school's approach to STEM teaching and how students respond to it. Photographs of classroom resources, STEM facilities, classroom displays and deidentified student work, may be collected by the researcher conducting data collection. Care will be taken not to include school staff or students in photographs and any student work will be de-identified before photographs are taken. School staff may also share photographs that have already received consent and are in the public domain. In this case, the author's attribution will be recorded.

These documents will be deidentified by school staff prior to sharing with the research team to ensure privacy and confidentiality are maintained. The PASL project will provide your school with consent forms to distribute to you as parents and carers and to students to authorise the sharing of student work samples and photographs. Additionally, your school principal will authorise all documents, including photographs, to ensure that no student or staff are not identified in ANY way. These data will provide insights into the school's approach to teaching STEM and its context which is the focus of this study.

Photos and work samples will be analysed by the research team to offer insight into the schools' approach to leadership of STEM, teaching of STEM and the physical context and artefacts that may contribute to building a positive STEM culture.

What do I need to do?



















If you agree to your child being involved in this study, we ask you to sign the consent form below. The survey will also start with a similar consent form to which your child must agree before beginning the survey questions. A copy of this form is attached to this information sheet.

Are there any possible benefits from participation in this study?

Your child's participation in this study will inform the improvement the PL that the principal is undertaking and hence contribute to improved STEM teaching and learning in your child's school and nationally. Anonymised survey results will assist the school to enhance STEM teaching and learning.

Are there any possible risks from participation in this study?

There are no specific risks anticipated with participation in this study.

What if I change my mind during or after the study?

Although we would be pleased to have your child's participation, we respect your right to decline. There will be no consequences to you, your child, or the school if you decide not to take part. The school will arrange alternative activities or relocate children to another class during the research activities so that there will be no negative effects.

As stated, personal privacy will be highly protected. No survey data will be individually identifiable because we will ask all participants to construct a unique code to complete the survey (as previously described). The PASL project team will not have access to individual's real names and as such, individual demographic data will not be linked to any person and cannot be reidentified. Once the data have been submitted to the project team, you may withdraw your child's individual data up until analysis commences. After this point, it may not be possible to withdraw your information because any specific identifiers will be removed.

What will happen to the information when this study is over?

The custodian of the PASL project research data is Chief Investigator Professor Sharon Fraser. Her contact details appear at the end of this letter. All raw data (audio file, field notes) will be stored separately in password protected University of Tasmania storage accessible only to the Project Chief Investigator and Project Manager. All de-identified data will be stored on secure storage in password protected files in perpetuity. These de-identified files will not be made available to other researchers for any purpose. PASL project team may use the data after the project to produce research publications on the PASL project, STEM leadership and PL.

How will the results of the study be published?

This is a nationally funded study. There will be progress reports and a final report to the Australian Government Department of Education and Training. Publications or presentations arising from this study will be subject to approval from this Department. Individuals or schools who have participated in the study will not be identified in any publication or presentation.
